Honour Roll

Timothy D. Crowe, renowned criminologist and author of the text book on Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design, passed away on February 21, 2009 after a brief cancer-related illness. Tim served as a consultant and trainer over a distinguished 35-year period during which time he personally trained over 6,000 police officers, community planners and design professionals from across the United States and numerous other countries. Tim lent his expertise to housing, school security and transportation programs in Japan, New Zealand, Australia, Canada, The Virgin Islands and Puerto Rico. He was also instrumental in the planning of major events and neighbourhood redevelopment programs.



Tim served as the Director of the National Crime Prevention Institute (NCPI) at the University of Louisville and created NCPI's CPTED training program and was the principle CPTED instructor for the American Crime Prevention Institute.

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On Oct. 19th, 2003, Tim was named the first Honourary member of CPTED Ontario having generously agreed to be the keynote speaker at the inaugural CPTED Ontario Conference held in Mississauga, Ontario in the fall of 2001. Tim was invited back to our 7th annual conference where he once again generously agreed to speak at the York Region Conference held in the fall of 2007.

Tim's academic studies include an extended stay in Florence, Italy, where he attended courses in architectural history and classics, a B. S. degree in Criminology and Humanities and a M. S. degree in Criminology.

Tim is fondly remembered by those who knew him and benefitted from his "unique intelligence, wit and humour".



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CPTED or Vanity?

Ever had the experience of having to wait for the elevator? Ever notice that some seem to take longer than others? Well, chances are you were standing next to an elevator set into a painted or papered wall. It seems that complaints about elevator wait times, which were common years ago, were significantly reduced when someone came up with the idea of placing full length mirrors next to them. Graffiti: Much More Than Meets The Eye

Most CPTED practitioners don't have to be told the importance of addressing graffiti before it takes hold. For us it is a simple manifestation of the broken window theory, that is, if one piece of graffiti is written and unaddressed, in time the entire object or structure will be covered. What hasn't been so obvious, at least up to now is "that teens who get involved in graffiti tagging may be showing early symptoms of a personality disorder". This according to Professor Graham Martin, Director of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry at the University of Queensland, who studied more than 2,600 13 year olds.

According to Martin, teens who get involved in graffiti "are significantly different to those who do not". They not only "satisfy the criteria for conduct disorder and or delinquency" but were found to be "scoring on the extreme range of antisocial behavior".

As such they typically have been involved in 6 to 8 other criminal acts ranging from such graffiti related crimes as stealing supplies and getting high, to "setting fires, beating people up and stealing". "They also had higher rates of drug use, academic failure, physical and sexual abuse, depression, anxiety and suicidal thoughts".

As this does not bode well for the conventional handling of a young graffiti vandal as a simple offender, it should be a wake-up call for those of us who are otherwise engaged in its clean up or prevention that we are likely dealing with a more motivated offender than was previously known and conventional solutions, including CPTED, may be simply not enough.
